

HILLSBORO CITY COUNCIL MEETING
Hillsboro Municipal Court – 130 Homestead Drive

April 11, 2016

At 7:00 p.m., Council President Pro-Tem, Richard Donley, called the Hillsboro City Council meeting to order. The following were present for the meeting: Mayor Drew Hastings, Todd Wilkin, Safety and Service Director; Fred Beery, Law Director; Gary Lewis, Auditor; and Debbie Sansone, Clerk. Lee Koogler, Council President, was absent.

ROLL CALL

Bill Alexander, Tracy Aranyos, Dick Donley, Justin Harsha, Claudia Klein, Ann Morris, and Becki Wilkin were present.

Mr. Donley led the council in prayer and Mayor Hastings led the Pledge of Allegiance.

MOTION Ms. Klein moved, seconded by Mr. Harsha, to excuse the absence of Mr. Koogler who was out of town. Vote: all yeas.

MINUTES

There were no additions or corrections to the meeting minutes from March 14, 2016. The minutes were approved as written.

MONTHLY REPORTS

There were no questions about the March 2016 monthly reports and the clerk read the reports by title only: Auditor, Income Tax Bureau, Police, Public Utilities, Street, Wastewater Treatment, Water Meter, Water/Sewer Maintenance, and Water Treatment.

Mr. Donley commented that the city employees are doing a good job and wanted to recognize a “good bunch of employees.” Ms. Aranyos complimented Chief Whited on the new format for the monthly police department report and credited Claudette Green for creating a format that offers more information and provides better communication to the public.

PUBLIC REQUESTS

Nicholas Beatty, owner of the DB Grill, the first food truck in the City of Hillsboro, addressed Council regarding the Hillsboro City Code sections 114.02 and 114.03 which are not conducive to a food truck business. The ordinance requires a background check which he has been waiting for since the end of February and prevents him from operating until the check is completed. The seller’s permit does not specify how long the permit is in effect. Mr. Beatty asked that Council review the ordinance and amend it to apply to food trucks and make it easier for people to conduct business in the city. He suggested a one-time fee used by many cities that limits the number of vendors and remains effective for a specified period of time, such as March through November.

Mr. Beatty’s food truck, by agreement with the property owner, will be located at a single location on private property. Mr. Beatty communicated with the Administration but realized that the delay in the background check, conducted by the Sheriff’s office, was out of the Administration’s control. He believes the ordinance should be reviewed by

Council. Mayor Hastings said the ordinance obviously does apply to food trucks and the city should help to do what they can to encourage new business.

Mr. Donley placed the matter into the Finance Committee to discuss the legislation. Mr. Wilkin asked Mr. Beatty what kind of license he had from the Health Department. He holds a seasonal license that ends in March. Mr. Wilkin suggested that Council grant a variance so that Mr. Beatty can begin operation right away. The ordinance was designed to protect the citizens from solicitations and peddlers and Mr. Beatty falls under that ordinance because he does not have a permanent business location. As the ordinance is written, Mr. Beatty needs to renew his license monthly. Mr. Donley asked Mr. Beery if Council could vote on a variance immediately to allow Mr. Beatty to operate at least until the committee meets. Mr. Beery said council can vote on the variance and after the Finance Committee meets it can review the variance to determine if it is still applicable.

MOTION Mr. Harsha, moved, seconded by Ms. Wilkin, to approve the variance to allow Mr. Beatty to begin the operation of his food truck. Vote: Mr. Alexander, yes; Ms. Aranyos, yes; Mr. Donley, yes; Mr. Harsha, yes; Ms. Klein, yes; Ms. Morris, abstain; Ms. Wilkin, yes. The motion passed.

CITIZENS' COMMENTS

Julia Wise, Executive Director of Highland County Community Action Organization, told Council that she oversees the management of some rental properties in the City of Hillsboro. She asked if the rate increase for water and sewer applied to multi-family units only or if single family and commercial properties are affected as well. Ms. Wilkin clarified that there is no increase to the water/sewer rates. Ms. Wise said that Highland Heights has 48 units and two meters. She said the increase for the complex would be 46 units times \$18.00, which is the increase for units that were not previously paying a minimum bill. Mr. Wilkin said the legislation is intended for users. Ms. Wise wanted clarification that "users" applied to multiple commercial units on one meter in one building. Ms. Wise made a case for the working people who rent her units for approximately \$400-\$500 per month. She said that there are units that have more than one family in the unit and asked rhetorically if at some point those people may be charged as well.

Robyn Coomer told Council that she believed the strain on the water/sewer system was the same for twelve units as it was to have twelve people in one house. She did not feel it was fair that the rest of the city went two years without an increase. She feels the legislation is unfair to multi-unit users. Ms. Coomer argued for the working, poor people who live at Highland Heights. She said the legislation needs to address commercial units as well. Ms. Aranyos explained that it is a fair solution to charge all units a minimum

and Council did not want to require that all units be metered individually because the cost would be too high. She said that the water department would accept, in good faith, a call from a landlord stating a unit was vacant. Ms. Aranyos explained that Council was only asking that everyone pay the same, including the minimum bill. Ms. Morris said the rent could be changed to compensate for the water bill, either reduce the rent and pay for the water or charge the renter more. There are no other cities that give free water. Ms. Coomer argued that there will be more vacancies if the water bill increases and owners will not be able to afford to maintain and upgrade their properties.

Diana Salen, Provident Management, manages forty properties (Treewood Apartments) and each month they pay \$2,000 for water and sewer, which is \$50 per property which is more than the minimum. Treewood is a rural assistance property with set rates determined by income. The average tenant is a working mother with two children earning minimum wage. Rent is set by the Federal and state governments, Treewood does not have a large reserve fund, and it is not making a lot of money. The tenants cannot afford an additional \$18 per month. Ms. Wilkin said that in regards to Ms. Salen's attitude that because the tenants are in a multi-unit apartment complex and are low-income, that no one else outside of that property is in the same situation. There are many low-income families that rent a house (single unit) and pay the minimum bill. Ms. Salen continued her argument that because her tenants pay \$50/month for water they are paying the minimum.

Ms. Aranyos argued that the comparison is not "apples to apples." Mayor Hastings compared the usage to buying Domino's Pizza. If you buy the first pizza at \$10.00 you get the second one for \$5.00. Multi-unit complexes are getting a lot of \$5.00 pizzas and a lot of people are paying for \$10.00 pizzas so that many can have a \$5.00 pizza. He said he appreciated Ms. Salen's passion for the issue and that she is advocating for the people she represents but he takes issue with the speakers at council that the city is somehow targeting the poor or people at a certain income level. That is not the case. The city is capturing 600-plus households that have never been captured. It makes the charges more equitable. The charge for a minimum bill is going to the property, not the individuals and the speakers are emotionalizing the issue.

Mr. Wilkin explained the cubic feet for the minimum bill and how the increase was derived. The intent is to hopefully prevent a scheduled rate increase in September and at that time review the possibility of increasing the cubic feet for the minimum rate or decreasing the cost of the minimum charge. All of this is contingent upon all users paying the minimum. It is possible that water bill could be lower in the future.

Melinda Slife, Fairfield Homes/Gorsuch Management, represents three properties in Hillsboro. The Hillsboro properties have among the highest water rates of the 100 properties they manage in Ohio. The units are income-based and the increase cannot be passed along to the tenant. The average water rate per unit is \$72.20. She argued that there is nothing to justify the increase. Mr. Wilkin suggested the use of a ----- meter to monitor the use of each unit and control the usage and raise awareness of usage. He said he did not come to this office to be a bureaucrat and say "this is what the book says." He wants to talk common sense. He's not asking her to install the meters or to ask each unit

to pay more when they use more water. Each user has an impact on the system and without paying the minimum, they are not paying their share of the money reserved for maintenance and repair on the system. Ms. Slife said that a \$3,500/month increase is a lot of money for one property.

Mayor Hastings said that single-family homes have been paying a minimum bill since the practice was first enacted. The multi-units have never paid it. The 600-plus units were lucky enough to not pay for all those years. Now the city is asking for parity for everyone to pay the same rate. As it stands there are approximately 2,600 units paying for the system but actually there are 3,200 units. It is possible that this contributes to the high water/sewer rates. Ms. Slife said that just because the city found an error in their system, it is not the fault of the complex owners and they should not be penalized. Mayor Hastings agreed that it was not their fault and explained that the city is following the lead of most cities in the state. It is a matter of making the system equitable. It is part of good government to find disparities and correct them. There is an obligation to every tax payer. Ms. Slife again said that \$72/month is a very high bill. He asked if there was an impetus for the tenant to monitor their water usage. Without that, they have no reason to conserve and the bill would likely be high.

Ms. Wilkin said she realized that \$72 per unit per month is a high bill but her water bill averages \$135 per month and she cannot make it lower. She does not want to see continued rate increases for water. What happened in the past is done and now everyone should pay the same (minimum). Ms. Slife suggested making the increase in smaller increments.

Sharry Moore spoke on behalf of Lilly Hill Senior Condominiums that were built approximately thirty years ago. There is one water meter and the water and sewer infrastructure was paid for with private funds. The condos will see a \$700/month increase and will cause a hardship on many of the residents. The city installed an overflow meter many years ago and charged the condos \$9.00/month for twenty years. There was never any excess water used and after twenty years the meter was removed.

Mr. Alexander asked if the city provided snow removal at Lilly Hill. Mr. Wilkin explained that the condos are private and if the streets are upgraded to city standards, the city will provide for the maintenance and snow removal of the streets. Lilly Hill made the decision years ago to not do this as did Summer Grove Condos. The agreements were made years ago as was the decision to use only one meter at Lilly Hill.

Ms. Wise addressed Council again to thank them for the opportunity to speak and to express that she and the others are not complaining. They are advocating for their tenants. She wanted to clarify that the change in the ordinance was for businesses as well as residential units.

Nancy Houser, Millennia Housing, said her complex pays about \$68,000 for water. Government subsidy is not guaranteed. There will need to be cuts made to compensate for the increase in the water bill. She feels they do a good job of making the complex

look nice but will no longer be able to maintain it as well after the increase. A rate increase will affect their residents because upgrades will no longer be possible.

Mr. Donley, on behalf of Council, expressed appreciation for everyone coming to share their comments.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR (Drew Hastings, Mayor)

Before he began his report, Mayor Hastings told the citizens that he was most responsible for the legislation and that he always tries to be fair. For all the people at the meeting who disagreed with the legislation, there were 6,000-plus other citizens that he represents who were not at the meeting. He gave the example of the residents who leave for Florida every year and the city shuts their water off and turns it back on in the spring but the single mom who cannot pay her bill pays to have her water turned back on. It needs to be equitable.

The City recently hired its first code enforcement officer, Phillip Lutton, who started March 28 and his duties will include everything from tall grass complaints to building condemnations. He welcomed Phillip and said he looks forward to his efforts in making Hillsboro a better place to live.

Mayor Hastings attended a meeting of the Hillsboro Area Economic Development Corporation (HAEDC) whose job it is to move local economic development forward. They have agreed to accept the Colony Theatre project but need a few more questions answered regarding construction oversight and insurance liability. HAEDC also agreed to act as the receiver for nuisance properties cited by the city.

The second Annual Kite Fly/Hillsboro Uptown Business Association (HUBA) Easter Egg Hunt was a huge success. He thanked Heather Collins, City Administration, and HUBA for working together to make the event successful.

Mayor Hastings said that most people know that he has been under a criminal investigation for the last four months. He recognizes that it has probably been a distraction for Council but he said it is only a distraction and he is not letting this hiccup derail any plans and progress that Hillsboro residents have looked forward to and expect. He assured Council and the public that he will stay the course and not let it impede the city's efforts.

The Mayor said he complains about the problems in Washington DC, that "they" cannot get along, and people are mad because nobody works together or gets along. One of the council members passed out Smiley Face badges and three members would not wear them. He said he was not trying to shame Council. He thought Council did not always make an effort to come together. Mayor Hastings said it was a little depressing that "we are not working together more." He said that no one is right or wrong; he just wants Council to try to work together a little more.

Demolition of Webster School will begin next week. He was glad that the Church of Christ decided to take care of the building. For the present the property will remain a green space until they decide what to do with it.

Barb Cole, citizen, said there was a committee meeting before Council and the committee members knew that she was there to comment. There was no announcement of the meeting and she had no idea they were quietly having the meeting. It should be a public meeting and she feels it is an important issue. Ms. Klein, Chairman of the Community Enhancement Committee, said that she called the committee meeting to order and apologized because she was late because she was making copies of the legislation. The crowd was talking and there was no public comment expected because the committee was meeting to review the final draft of legislation before recommending it to Council. Ms. Cole asked why there would be a public meeting without hearing public comment. Ms. Klein responded that the legislation has been discussed for almost two years and there have been numerous opportunities for public comment, citing numerous comments from Ms. Cole during that time. At the last committee meeting Ms. Cole said she would contact Ms. Klein to offer suggestions but Ms. Klein never heard anything from Ms. Cole and the committee proceeded with the legislation. Ms. Klein said that a public meeting does not necessarily mean that the public will have opportunity to speak, but they are invited to attend. After two years of public comments, Ms. Klein wanted her committee to review the legislation to make a recommendation to Council.

Mayor Hastings addressed Ms. Wilkin, saying that he did not want her to take offense to his earlier comments but it seems to him that Council is somewhat broken. The wearing of the badges by half of the council begged a "mention." Ms. Wilkin does not feel that Council is broken but she does not agree with some of the things he wants to do, which constitutes a "checks and balance." The Mayor said he does not expect a 7-0 vote on everything, but is asking for more cooperation among all concerned.

Ms. Morris asked the Mayor if he could provide a timeline for the Plaza to get it moving and report on it at the May meeting. She would like to see it started before it gets too late in the year. Ms. Aranyos agreed that she would like to see ground broken for the Plaza and get it started. Mayor Hastings said to get to the final plan from the rendering stage will take some time. He will work on it. Ms. Aranyos said she would like to see the Colony project progress, too. The Mayor said there was a meeting with the HAEDC (which he reported earlier) and they had some questions they needed answered and then will begin the project. Ms. Klein suggested that a sign be erected with a partial rendering of the Plaza stating when it will begin so the citizens know it is moving forward. A sign for the Colony project would be good, too.

Ms. Aranyos commended Chief Whited on the new style of monthly report and said she appreciates having a better overall view of the Police Department and made it known to Administration that she is behind the Police Department and whatever the budget entails she supports the hiring of more officers.

There were no questions for Mayor Hastings.

SAFETY AND SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Wilkin congratulated Jeff Murphy as the Employee of the Month of March and that he will retire from the Police Department on April 22, 2016. He is sorry to see Jeff leave but happy that he can retire and plan a life in front of him. Captain Murphy was with the department for nearly 27 years. He was a patrol officer, an undercover drug officer, a sergeant, and a captain. He will be missed. Jim Herdman, Water Treatment Plant, will also retire. Jim worked for the city for nearly 22 years and his dedication to Hillsboro is appreciated.

Mr. Wilkin announced the hiring of a Code Enforcement Officer, Phillip Lutton. Phillip has six years of code enforcement in Washington Courthouse. Mr. Wilkin recapped the property maintenance progress the City has made: 10 properties in 2012, 40 properties in 2013, 89 properties in 2014, and 145 properties in 2015. These numbers are based on a part-time effort. Phillip will also help to implement the sidewalk program.

The proposed water/sewer ordinance amendment was updated to define a "user" and it includes commercial and residential. Mediation with CH2M Hill begins April 12 in regards to the wastewater treatment plant problem. Mr. Wilkin asked to enter into Executive Session to discuss the mediation. There were no questions for Mr. Wilkin.

MOTION Ms. Morris moved, seconded by Ms. Klein, to enter into Executive Session to discuss mediation for the wastewater treatment plant problem. Vote: all yeas. Council entered into Executive Session at 8:47 p.m. Council returned to Regular Session at 9:01 p.m.

AUDITOR'S REPORT (Gary Lewis, Auditor)

Mr. Lewis presented the year-to-date fund report and year-to-date bank report with a balance of \$6,148,272.58 in various bank accounts and in investments and cash-on-hand for operational purposes. Mr. Lewis asked for a motion to accept the report as submitted.

MOTION Ms. Morris moved, seconded by Ms. Klein, to accept the Auditor's report. There was no further discussion. Vote: all yeas. Council accepted the report.

Mr. Lewis explained the legislation he presented to Council:

- Increase appropriation in the General Fund – the Police Department received a grant from the Cassner Foundation in the amount of \$8,500
- Referring to Resolution 16-09 passed on March 14, 2016 – he is asking for an increase in unclaimed funds to satisfy the auditors

There were no questions for Mr. Lewis.

PLANNING COMMISSION (Mayor Hastings, Chair)

The Hillsboro Planning Commission met at 5:30 p.m. on March 15, 2016 in the Hillsboro Firehouse Community Room. Present for the meeting were Tom Eichinger, Chair, Stephen Crouch, Mayor Hastings, and Ruth Robbins. Also present were Tracy Aranyos and Joe Mahan.

The Commission accepted a resignation letter from long-time member, Kevin Barreras. Kevin's experience and institutional knowledge will be missed. Kevin was with the Planning Commission for about twelve years and was very committed to the Commission. The Commission also received a letter from Bob Skoog, Jr., stating that his father was no longer interested in developing his North High Street properties and will sell them. Mr. Skoog approached the Commission in 2015 regarding a development idea.

The Uptown residential discussions continued from previous meetings. The Commission agreed that current residential units in the Historic District should be "grandfathered" as well as the Marathon gas station. They reiterated their recommendation that no residential units be allowed on the first floor. The meeting adjourned at 6:30 p.m. There were no questions for Mayor Hastings.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

FINANCE COMMITTEE (Dick Donley, Chair)

Mr. Donley spoke with Mr. Pence, Director of *Grow! Highland County*, and received permission from President Koogler to withdraw the item from the Committee agenda and possibly look at the issue in the fall.

The Finance Committee met on April 7, 2016, at 6:45 p.m. in the meeting room of the firehouse on North East Street. Present for the meeting were committee members Ms. Morris, Mr. Alexander, and Mr. Donley. Also present were Council members Ms. Klein, Ms. Aranyos, and Mr. Harsha; Gary Lewis, Auditor, and Mayor Hastings. The meeting was called to discuss the purchase of the property on Governor Trimble Place because some of the council members had concerns about the purchase. There were questions about the benefit of purchasing this property as it relates to the Plaza. The plans for the development of the plaza were brought to Council several months ago and the feedback from the community was very positive to continue with the Plaza. There was discussion and a motion was made to keep Ordinance No. 2016-02 (purchase of the Armintrout Building on Governor Trimble Place) for a couple more months. Mr. Donley and Mr. Alexander voted to keep the matter in committee and Ms. Morris voted to proceed with the third reading. There were no questions for Mr. Donley.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE AND RESTORATION (Ann Morris, Chair)

The Committee did not meet but had legislation ready for a council vote to amend the sign ordinance to eliminate fees on certain replacement signs. There were no questions for Ms. Morris.

CIVIL SERVICE AND EMPLOYEE RELATIONS COMMITTEE (William Alexander, Chair)

The Committee met on April 7, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. at the Hillsboro Firehouse. Present for the meeting was Ms. Klein, Ms. Wilkin, and Mr. Alexander. Also present were Council members Mr. Harsha, Tracy Aranyos, Ms. Morris, and Mr. Donley. The Committee discussed current civil service regulations and the city's civil service rules handbook which has not been updated since 1985 as well as current job descriptions. The

Committee will review discrepancies between the ordinances and/or positions, potential changes in classification of city employees and make certain that pay ordinances are in unison with other legislation. The Committee will work with the Civil Service Commission to complete the work. The meeting adjourned at 6:30 p.m.

Mayor Hastings asked Mr. Alexander if he looked at the job description currently underway with the Police Department. Mr. Alexander's answer was inaudible. Mr. Donley said the committee was looking at the current job descriptions to determine which positions should be classified or unclassified. Mr. Alexander said the Committee was not writing any job descriptions, which answered Mayor Hastings question.

STREET AND SAFETY COMMITTEE (Justin Harsha, Chair)

Mr. Harsha attended the March 21, 2016 Festival of the Bells Committee meeting. The April meeting is the same night as the current Council meeting. Chief Whited attended the meeting also, and said he is trying to obtain funds from Ohio Homeland Security for safety observation towers. Mr. Harsha talked to Mayor Hastings and Mr. Wilkin before the festival meeting about keeping the festival uptown but in a different location. The Festival Committee said they could not make those changes for the 2016 festival but will continue to talk about it for the future. There were no questions for Mr. Harsha.

UTILITIES COMMITTEE (Becki Wilkin, Chair)

There was no meeting.

ZONING AND ANNEXATION COMMITTEE (Tracy Aranyos, Chair)

There was no meeting.

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT (Claudia Klein, Chair)

The Committee met prior to the Council meeting at 6:37 p.m. Present for the meeting were committee members Ms. Wilkin, Mr. Donley, and Ms. Klein. They reviewed the yard sale legislation and the committee will recommend it to Council. There were no questions for Ms. Klein.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

PASSAGE OF ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS (THIRD READING)

- **Ordinance No. 2016-02** An Ordinance to Enter Into a Purchase Agreement for the Acquisition of Two Parcels of Real Property from John C. Wilkin and to Transfer One Parcel to the Hillsboro Area Economic Development Corporation and to Declare an Emergency

MOTION Mr. Harsha moved, seconded by Ms. Wilkin, to keep the legislation in committee for two months. Vote: Mr. Alexander, yes; Ms. Aranyos, no; Mr. Donley, yes; Mr. Harsha, yes; Ms. Klein, no; Ms. Morris, no; and Ms. Wilkin, yes. Ordinance No. 2016-02 will remain in committee for an additional 60 days.

SECOND READING OF ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

- **Ordinance No. 2016-03** An Ordinance to Amend Section 51.041 of the City Code to Provide Additional Definitions and Requirements for Shut-Off and Turn-On Fees *Introduced by the Utilities Committee of Council*

The Clerk read an amendment to the ordinance.

MOTION Ms. Wilkin moved, seconded by Mr. Harsha, to amend Ordinance No. 2016-03, adding Section (E) “For the purposes of this section, “dwelling”, “real property” and “unit” shall refer to individual dwelling units regardless of location in a commercial or residential building.” Vote: all yeas. Ordinance No. 2016-03 was amended and given a second reading.

FIRST READING OF ORDINANCES & RESOLUTIONS

- **Resolution No. 16-12** A Resolution to Amend the Zoning Map of the City of Hillsboro to Change the Zoning of 261 West Walnut Street and 957 North High Street from “Residential A” to “Residential B” *Introduced by the Safety and Service Director* The resolution does not require three readings.

MOTION Mr. Harsha moved, seconded by Ms. Aranyos, to approve and adopt Resolution No. 16-12. Vote: all yeas. The resolution was approved and adopted.

- **Resolution No. 16-13** A Resolution to Increase Appropriations in 701 Unclaimed Funds *Recommended by the Auditor* The resolution is appropriation in nature and does not require suspension of the Three Reading Rule and the necessity of the legislation was explained by the Auditor.

MOTION Ms. Aranyos moved, seconded by Ms. Klein, to approve and adopt Resolution No. 16-13. Vote: all yeas. Council approved and adopted the resolution.

- **Resolution No. 16-14** A Resolution to Increase Appropriations in Small Tools/Donations in the Police budget *Recommended by the Auditor* The resolution is appropriation in nature and does not require suspension of the Three Reading Rule and the necessity of the legislation was explained by the Auditor.

MOTION Ms. Klein moved, seconded by Ms. Wilkin, to approve and adopt Resolution No. 16-14. Vote: all yeas. Council approved and adopted the resolution.

- **Ordinance No. 2016-04** An Ordinance to Amend Sections 114.07 and 116.01, et seq., of the Hillsboro Code of Ordinances to Facilitate Yard Sales in the City *Introduced by the Community Enhancement Committee*

The ordinance received a first reading.

- **Ordinance No. 2016-05** An Ordinance to Amend Sections 153.02 and 153.06 of the City Code to Eliminate Fees on Certain Replacement Signs *Introduced by the Property Maintenance and Restoration Committee*
